Paul Hammond

As the newest member of the OCME board and your treasurer, let me introduce myself. My name is Paul Hammond. I'm one of the farther flung regular members who lives up in Woodland Hills, which is in the San Fernando Valley.

My love for trains began as a child playing with my older brother's HO train set. He wouldn't let me run the engine, so the best I could do was to pretend the caboose was an engine and pull the train around the track. I was all of 5 or 6 at the time. As time progressed I took over that train set and built layouts with scenery and buildings and wired the houses with lights, and added streetlights, and signals. At a very early age I was determined to be a locomotive engineer.

When I was 10 or 11, I learned of the Los Angeles Live Steamers and became enamored. I acquired catalogs from Little Engines, and tried to convince my father that we should buy a lathe and build a kit. He was not convinced and the opportunity to join the live steam hobby at an early age passed.

When I went off to college in the Midwest my high school buddies insured my love for trains would continue by giving me a starter n-scale train set. It was very popular in the dorm. Between the engineering students and the architecture students and some significant track investment by myself... this starter train set expanded to travel above our heads across the room suspended by two by fours. Then the bright idea came along to add a multi-level helix. Unfortunately due to the less than adequate couplers on n-scale cars of that day, several cars met their untimely demise as they uncoupled and did high speed descents around the helix eventually losing to inertia and centripetal force shooting the cars across the room.

After college my love for trains still persisted. Not long after the Northridge earthquake in 1994, I applied with 1500 other people for a job with the Southern Pacific Railroad to be a locomotive engineer. After a battery of tests and interviews I found myself as one of the top 12 candidates for the job. I didn't pass the final interview with the yardmaster because of my fear of what the adverse impact of being on call 24 hours a day 365 days a year would have on my future family.

Ironically not long after missing out on that opportunity, I started a long and prosperous career in Information Technology which also had me on call 24 hours a day 365 days a year. And also ironically the family I was so worried about impacting has yet to materialize.

In 2006, it was out of the desire to gain more balance in my life instead of being a workaholic that my interest in 7.5 inch gauge railroading was renewed. I started visiting clubs such as LALS, Bitter Creek, and Maricopa. It was during a Fall Meet in Phoenix where I met Terry Cummings & Mike Springer & Myron Peterson. Until I met them I didn't even know there was a club in Orange County. After some friendly shepherding by those three that weekend, I was invited to visit OCME during their next work day. That day I found friendly welcoming members who enjoyed sharing their knowledge of their hobby with a novice. I acquired an application and joined the following month.

Now I find myself two years later a board member of an active group of members who love trains, who enjoy serving the public, and who can always find camaraderie among its members.
